## **HEALTHCARE for YIBEN**



Kayiben (the village of Yiben, pronounced '*Ee-ben*') lies south-east of Fadugu in the Koinadugu District of Sierra Leone, one of the poorest areas in the country. The village consists of approximately 40 traditional mud-brick houses and is surrounded by numerous smaller villages with a combined population of more than 1000.

The people of these communities are subsistence farmers relying entirely on the seasons and hard work to survive. They are disadvantaged by isolation and poverty and lack access to basic services. Their most urgent needs have always been for healthcare and education.

Thanks to the friendship and dedication of a local visionary Minkailu Bantama (Mallam), and funding from friends in the UK and Australia, the Yiben community built a school to bring education and opportunity to their children. The school serves a number of other villages and places Yiben as a 'hub' for the area.

Now they have built a healthcare facility so they can access national health programs, maternal and child services, basic treatments for common ailments and health education.



A chief in his own community near Fadugu, Mallam has strived for education and healthcare for the people of this remote area since 2006. Working closely with Yiben's Chief Bangalie and Mammy Queen Serah, Mallam has brought their dreams of a school and health clinic to reality.

## **SET4LIFE Australia**

SET4LIFE Australia is a small fundraising group based in the regional Queensland city of Gympie. Our members began working with Mallam to support the development of the Yiben School in 2011. Our involvement helped to establish the UK-based charity, Set4Life, in 2013; and in 2015 our group established Set4Life Australia to increase the support we could give. Our first project as Set4Life Australia was to fund a modern, equipped well near the school to provide clean water for the whole community.

With access to education achieved, healthcare became their priority. Set4Life UK continues to support the school, while Set4Life Australia has committed to fund and facilitate healthcare. We are working with Mallam and the local Healthcare Committee, the Fadugu Community Health Officer, the Ministry of Health and in-country NGOs for Women's health. With Mallam's expert management, the construction of a Maternal and Child Health Post that is part of the national health system is complete. Our website provides more information about our organisation, and the conditions, lifestyle and needs of the communities we are helping.

The Gympie connection with Yiben began when hometown nurse and midwife, Amy Coates volunteered her skills in Sierra Leone in 2009. She worked there over several years in different areas of health development and her mum Jude, a Gympie teacher, visited twice. In 2011, with Mallam as guide, Jude spent a week in Yiben helping in the fledgling school. Inspired by the needs of the village and Mallam's compassion, Jude and friends began their fundraising. Amy now works for World Health Org. and brings to the team her passion for health development and her wealth of connections and experience in Sierra Leone.
